

Speaking Up Through Action: Advocating for Child-Friendly Cities

This year, UNICEF Young Envoys conducted a two countries, three cities field trip. In Suzhou and Hangzhou, they explored how local governments are developing 'Child-Friendly Communities', experiencing firsthand how these initiatives advance child rights. In Vientiane, the Young Envoys visited UNICEF Lao PDR to learn about local operations and child-related challenges, gaining a broader international perspective. Furthermore, they were received by the Embassy of the People's Republic of China in the Laos PDR, where they learned about China's support programmes aimed at improving child well-being in Lao PDR.

Cross-Border Exchange and Learning

The seven-day field visit blended technological innovation with cultural exchange. Young Envoys not only gained insight into the planning of 'Child-Friendly Communities' but also had the opportunity to witness firsthand how innovative technologies address children's needs across various dimensions – such as mobility and road safety – thereby advancing child rights.

The true story of a Laotian schoolgirl who sought help from UNICEF to continue her education left a deep impression on me. Initially, her parents believed children should join the workforce as early as possible and even stopped her from attending school. Fortunately, after UNICEF's intervention, they came to understand the importance of education and allowed her to attend school. It showed me how cultural beliefs can significantly challenge children's right to development.

Suzhou and Hangzhou offered me fresh insights toward building child-friendly cities. Initiatives such as 'looking at the city from a one-meter standpoint', the creation of '15-minute child-friendly living circles', and the establishment of children's councils—which empower children to voice their opinions on local issues and help turn their suggestions into reality—are truly awe-inspiring.

Creative Advocacy



Through a questionnaire survey, the Young Envoys examined the current use of artificial intelligence (AI) in learning among secondary school students in Hong Kong, thereby raising public awareness of educational issues. Concurrently, during the youth exchange session, they shared the objectives and rationale of the research project with local youth in Lao PDR.



Pledge to Promote Breast Milk Donation



With the commencement of services at Hong Kong Breast Milk Bank, more than 3,000 workplaces and premises throughout Hong Kong have committed to be 'Breastfeeding Friendly,' helping deliver vital nutrition to premature and critically ill infants. To raise public awareness about breastfeeding, the Department of Health, in collaboration with the Hospital Authority, UNICEF HK and Baby Friendly Hospital Initiative Hong Kong Association organized World Breastfeeding Week 2025 celebration. This year's theme is 'Prioritize Breastfeeding, and Create Sustainable Support Systems.'

Every Child Matters UNICEF's Lifesaving Response in Afghanistan



On 31 August, a 6.0-magnitude earthquake struck Afghanistan, deepened an already dire humanitarian crisis. Even before the quake, over 10 million children were suffering from severe malnutrition and were in urgent need of aid—conditions that have now worsened significantly.



Within just **72** hours, UNICEF supported **291** medical facilities, completed **304** surgeries, and successfully treated over **2,500** trauma cases.

UNICEF acted immediately, mobilized surge teams, supplies, and resources to address urgent needs in affected areas. Over 130 tonnes of live-saving humanitarian supplies were cleared for rapid delivery. Child-Friendly Spaces were set up to help children feel safe and supported. Every tent set up, every child comforted, and every life saved was a testament to the power of humanitarian action.



Standing with Children in Conflict Zones

By almost every measure in UNICEF's history, 2024 has been one of the worst years on record for children in conflict. Over 473 million children—more than one in six globally—lived in conflict-affected areas.

ZeShan Foundation Supports Sudan Child Protection Programme

Sudan is currently experiencing one of the world's most severe humanitarian crises. Over 15.6 million children are in urgent need of humanitarian due to widespread displacement, family separation, exposure to violence and threats posed by unexploded ordnance and landmines. In response, ZeShan Foundation has generously contributed to UNICEF's child protection programme for at least 800 vulnerable children, 300 caregivers and 150 local social workers in Khartoum and Aljazeera States that commenced in May 2025. This vital support helps prevent the collapse of the social welfare system and ensures continued delivery of life-saving services. UNICEF HK deeply appreciates ZeShan Foundation's trust and generosity. We are committed to using these funds effectively to reach the most vulnerable children and families.
